

Into that heaven of freedom, my Father, let my country awake




The principal of the college requested the parents to take an active role in guiding their children and supporting them in their educational journey. Thus, he emphasized on the importance of collaboration between home and college.

Inauguration of Department Association by the Department of Computer Application




Chetan Bhagat's "The Girl in Room 105"



Fyodor Dostoevsky's "Devils"



Hello, my name is Sasidhar. and I'm **Fyodor** reviewing Dostoevsky's "Devils" (also translated as "Demons"). This novel explores nihilism and its x t r e m e consequences in 1860s Russia, where

it was either nihilism or nothing.

As an atheist, I find the concept of God to be a leap of faith that contradicts scientific progress. However, I appreciate how Dostoevsky portrays a godless society, echoing Nietzsche's quote, "Not all men are born equal." Interestingly, Nietzsche's views on women's equality are left unaddressed, leaving it to modern "woke" socialists to interpret.

I'm a fan of Periyar's socialism, but I recognize its limitations. This book highlights how people can cross into extremism, and how both religion and socialism can cloud our judgement. The story revolves around Stepan Verkhovensky, an idealist moulded by

Varvara Petrovna, a wealthy woman in high society. Her son, Nikolai Stavrogin, is an enigmatic aristocrat with multiple love interests, making it difficult to discern his true intentions.

The character of Pyotr Verkhovensky is particularly intriguing, initially appearing rude but ultimately revealing himself as an extremist. The novel shows how Russian society was influenced by extreme socialism, leading to nihilism, moral decay, and the erosion of individuality.

Shatov, a former God-fearing man, is caught in the whirlwind of ideologies and becomes a threat when he rebels against Pyotr's plans. Dostoevsky suggests that an average person needs God to maintain sanity, which I find contradictory. Socialism has its benefits, especially in uplifting third-world countries, but it can be detrimental to well-established societies, repressing human emotions and striving for an unattainable perfection.

The novel's portrayal of posh characters and their intricate relationships was initially challenging to follow, but as the story progressed, I grasped the author's intention. The tragic events that unfold demonstrate that too much of anything is harmful, especially when forced upon people in a short span.

The thrilling scene of Shatov's murder is well-crafted, making the reader feel like a part of the murderers. The characters' battles before the assassination reflect how far they were deluded by socialism.

While I found some aspects of the story odd, such as the characters' behaviour and the focus on marriage and political compromise, I recommend this book to anyone willing to confront the haunting idea of nihilism.
