



A man with a Vision on a Mission: Mahatma Gandhi



As we observe Gandhi Jayanti on October 2nd, we reflect on the profound principles and values of

Mahatma Gandhi, a beacon of peace and non-violence whose legacy continues to inspire movements for justice and equality around the world. He was a leader innate with a clear Vision.

1.Non-Violence (Ahimsa)

Central to Gandhi's ethos is the principle of non-violence otherwise called 'Ahimsa'. He believed that true strength lies not in physical power, rather in the capacity to confront injustice without resorting to violence. Gandhi's approach was revolutionary; he advocated for peaceful protests and civil disobedience as effective means to challenge oppression. This commitment to non-violence influenced numerous leaders, including Martin Luther King, Jr. and Nelson Mandela, and it remains a guiding principle in many modern social movements.

2.Truth (Satya)


Introducing free Online courses in colloboration with Deed Trust



MOVIE REVIEW OF THE FILM "VAAZHAI"

Directed by Mari Selvaraj, the film "Vazhai" was released in theatres on August 23rd, 2024, and I watched it with my family on the 24th of August 2024.

Previously, Mari's films like "Pariyerum Perumal," "Maamannan," and "Karnan" depicted the pain, suffering, and humiliation of marginalised communities in a direct manner. However, "Vazhai" takes a different approach. Through a nuanced and realistic narrative, it beautifully portrays the struggles of a family and the people around them.

The performances of the two 'child' actors were particularly impressive. From the very beginning, the storyline made us feel connected to their experiences. The film captures the emotions of



childhood: the anger, the teasing, the affection a student feels for a teacher, the disdain for school holidays, the family's poverty, a mother's struggles, a sister's love, and a father's affection. It also includes scenes of fans of Rajinikanth and Kamal Haasan, along with the sister's romance, encapsulating the harsh realities of life and the sorrows of people in the southern districts, all conveyed in their regional dialect.

The film highlights the ruthlessness of businessmen, from local traders to corporate tycoons, who will do anything for profit, often neglecting workers' safety. The portrayal of a tragedy that



transforms the village into a graveyard, including the true incident where 19 labourers died in an accident, left the audience stunned.

While Mari's storytelling was compelling, Santosh Narayanan's music also played a significant role in conveying the people's grief. The background score poignantly underscored their struggles. The closing scene featuring the poignant

song "Paathagathi," paired with powerful visuals, held the audience captive even after the film ended.



Through "Vazhai," Mari demonstrates that art and literature are ultimately for the people. My congratulations to Mari for showcasing such an extraordinary story into a film.
