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My dear friends,

Greetings to all of you. The month of March highlights two events: Women's day and the season of Lent for Catholics highlighting the values that are valid for all.

Empowering Women, Empowering Humanity

On this occasion of "**Women's Day**", two incidents that highlight the humiliation and inequality faced by women, hurt us even today:

The Mathura Rape Case (1972): Mathura, a 16-year-old tribal girl from Maharashtra, India, was raped by two policemen while in custody. The case gained widespread attention due to the gross miscarriage of justice. The Supreme Court of India initially acquitted the accused, citing that Mathura had "consented" to the act. This ruling sparked widespread outrage and protests, leading to changes in India's rape laws.

The Nirbhaya Case (2012): Jyoti Singh, a 23-year-old physiotherapy student, was brutally gang-raped and murdered on a bus in Delhi, India. The incident shocked the nation and sparked widespread protests, demanding justice and stricter laws against sexual violence. The case led to significant changes in India's laws and policies related to sexual assault.

These and many other recent incidents highlight the need for continued efforts towards gender equality, challenging the deep-rooted societal attitudes that perpetuate violence and discrimination against women. It can serve as a catalyst for the young people to take action and promote gender equality:

- **Raise awareness:** Organize workshops, discussions, and campaigns to raise awareness about gender-based violence and discrimination.
- **Challenge stereotypes:** Encourage young people to question and challenge societal stereotypes and biases that perpetuate gender inequality.
- **Promote empathy:** Foster empathy and understanding towards survivors of gender-based violence and discrimination.
- **Support policy changes:** Advocate for policy changes and laws that promote gender equality and protect women's rights.

- **Engage men and boys:** Involve men and boys in the conversation and encourage them to become allies in promoting gender equality.



Women's Day is significant as it acknowledges the vital role women play in the state's social, cultural, and economic fabric. While in Tamil culture and literature, the dignity of women is highlighted, in reality, they are humiliated. Gender equality remains a huge challenge.

Ash Wednesday and Lent: Prayer, Penance and Charity

Christians observe Ash Wednesday this year on 5th March. It marks the beginning of Lent that serves as a powerful reminder of the importance of penance, sacrifice, and spiritual growth in the Christian journey and helps Christians prepare for Easter and deepen their relationship with God. During Lent, Christians often observe various practices, such as:

Fasting: Giving up certain foods or habits to discipline the body and focus on spiritual growth.

Abstinence: Refraining from certain activities or pleasures to detach from worldly attachments.

Prayer: Increasing prayer and reflection to deepen one's relationship with God.

Almsgiving: Engaging in acts of charity and kindness to help those in need.

These themes of Lent are not just for Catholics but for all. In Tamil culture and literature, self-control, sacrifice, and dhavam are essential virtues, deeply rooted in the state's rich philosophical and spiritual heritage.

Self-Control (தன்னியல்பு)

It refers to the ability to regulate one's thoughts, emotions, and actions. It involves:

- **Emotional regulation:** Controlling emotions like anger, desire, and greed.
- **Mindfulness:** Being aware of one's thoughts and actions.
- **Discipline:** Cultivating self-discipline to achieve goals and overcome challenges.

In Tamil literature, self-control is often depicted as a key virtue for achieving spiritual growth and success. For example, the “Tirukkural”, emphasizes the importance of self-control. In Chapter 11, “Aram” (Virtue), Thiruvalluvar writes:

“தன்னை வென்றவன் தன்னை வெல்லும்
பிறனை வெல்லும் பெருமை உடையான்”

(“One who has conquered oneself is greater than one who has conquered others.”)

Sacrifice (தயாகம்)

It refers to the act of giving up something precious or desirable for the benefit of others or for a higher cause. It involves:

- **Letting go:** Releasing attachment to worldly possessions or desires.
- **Selflessness:** Prioritizing the needs of others over one’s own needs.
- **Renunciation:** Giving up worldly pleasures or comforts for spiritual growth.

Sacrifice is often depicted as a noble virtue that leads to spiritual growth and liberation. For example, the Tamil epic, the “*Ramayana*”, tells the story of Rama’s sacrifice of his kingdom and family for the sake of duty and righteousness.

“*Silappatikaram*” tells the story of Kannagi and Kovalan in which Kannagi’s sacrifice and dhavam are exemplified when she:

- Gives up her wealth and status to follow her husband, Kovalan
- Undergoes severe austerities to prove her chastity
- Ultimately, sacrifices her life to avenge her husband’s death

Dhavam (தவம்)

It refers to spiritual austerity or penance. It involves:

Meditation: Focusing the mind on spiritual growth and self-realization.

Fasting: Practicing self-control and detachment from worldly desires.

Prayer: Cultivating a deep sense of devotion and connection with the divine.

In Tamil literature, dhavam is often depicted as a means of achieving spiritual growth, self-realization, and liberation. For example, the Tamil poet, Thiruvalluvar, writes about the importance of dhavam in his Tirukkural, emphasizing its role in cultivating self-control, compassion, and wisdom.

Thiruvasagam (தருவாசகம்), is a Tamil devotional text that emphasizes the importance of self-control and dhavam. In one of the poems, Manickavasagar writes:

“தன்னை வென்றவன் தானே வெல்லும்
பிறனை வெல்லும் பெருமை உடையான்”

Translated to: “One who has conquered oneself is the greatest conqueror.”

These three virtues – self-control, sacrifice, and dhavam – are deeply intertwined in Tamil culture and literature, reflecting the state’s rich spiritual and philosophical heritage. These are the virtues Lent highlights and these are the virtues that will lead us to promote gender equality.

God bless you all. Special wishes to all our women in the campus, teaching and non-teaching staff and the girl students.

Embracing the Art of Mentoring: A Call to Professors

In the fast-paced, ever-evolving world of higher education, the role of professors has never been more critical. As we navigate the complexities of mentoring the next generation of leaders, it is essential to recognize that the traditional methods of control, information dissemination, and protection may no longer suffice. Instead, we must embrace a new paradigm that fosters connection, interpretation, and preparation. This article aims to guide professors in making the necessary shifts to bring out the best in their students.

Shift 1: From Control to Connect

In a world where young people are bombarded with information and choices, the old approach of exerting control is becoming increasingly ineffective. Studies show that parents who over-program their child's schedule often breed kids who rebel as teens. Instead of trying to control every aspect of a student's life, we must focus on building meaningful connections. When we connect with our students, we create a bridge of trust and relationship that can withstand the weight of honest feedback and guidance. Once we connect, we build a bridge of relationship that can bear the weight of truth. We earn our right to influence them.

Example: A professor who takes the time to understand a student's interests and aspirations, rather than dictating a rigid academic path, is more likely to inspire genuine engagement and commitment.

Shift 2: From Inform to Interpret

The digital age has made information more accessible than ever before. Students today have the world at their fingertips, but they often lack the context to make sense of it all. This is the first generation of kids that don't need adults to get information. What they need from us is interpretation. Our role as educators should shift from being mere sources of information to becoming guides who help students interpret and contextualize the vast amount of data they encounter.

Example: Instead of simply lecturing on a historical event, a professor can facilitate a discussion that explores the event's broader implications and its relevance to contemporary issues.

Shift 3: From Entertain to Equip

The pressure to keep students engaged can sometimes lead to a focus on entertainment rather than education.

However, If I give them relevant tools to succeed, they'll stay engaged. Happiness is a byproduct. True satisfaction comes from growth. Our goal should be to equip students with the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in the real world, rather than merely keeping them entertained.



Example: A business professor who incorporates real-world case studies and practical projects into the curriculum is more likely to prepare students for the challenges they will face in their careers.

Shift 4: From Do It for Them to Help Them Do It

The well-intentioned desire to boost students' self-esteem can sometimes lead to doing things for them rather than helping them achieve on their own. According to the American Psychological Association, "Healthy and robust self-esteem actually comes from achievement, not merely affirmation." As educators, we must focus on long-term development rather than short-term gratification.

Example: A writing professor who provides constructive feedback and encourages students to revise their work, rather than simply correcting it for them, is fostering a sense of achievement and self-efficacy.

Shift 5: From Impose to Expose

When students struggle, it's tempting to impose rules and behaviours to ensure compliance. However, If kids feel forced to do it, they usually don't take ownership of it. It becomes someone else's idea, not theirs. Instead, we should expose students to new ideas and opportunities, allowing them to take ownership of their learning and growth.

Example: A science professor who organizes field trips and hands-on experiments, rather than just lecturing, is more likely to spark students' curiosity and passion for the subject.

Shift 6: From Protect to Prepare

While ensuring the safety and well-being of our students is paramount, we must also prepare them for the challenges of adulthood. The greatest gift we can give our children is the ability to get along without us. We should focus on equipping students with the skills

Example: A psychology professor who discusses real-life scenarios and coping strategies, rather than just theoretical concepts, is better preparing students for the

Unlock Your Superpower: Discover the Art of Self-Discipline and Transform Your Life

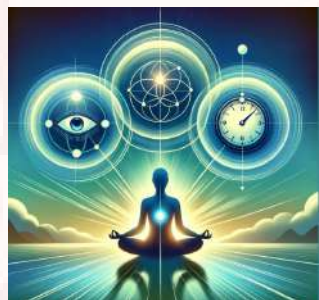

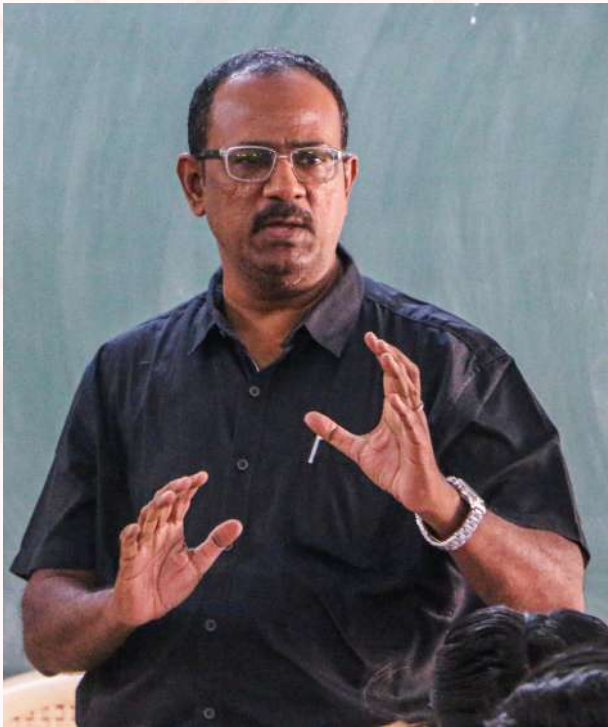

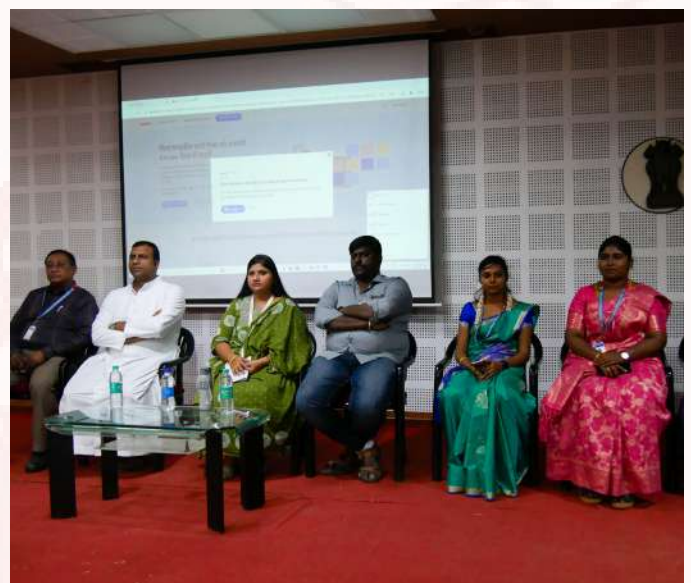
