In our schools, colleges, and workplaces, people form opinions about us not from the big presentations





Workshop on "Journey to Self-Esteem: Finding Your Inner Strength"



Industrial Visit & Hands-on Training "Website Designing"






Intramural Boys Volleyball Tournament

(A poem dedicated to my little brother)


You are my little hero who stays calm inside my heart and always played the bravest part. You were my protector who's always brave, even when I didn't know what I gave.
